Southern California Wetlands Recovery Project (WRP)

What is the WRP?

- Created in 1997 by an MOU between 17 State and Federal Resource Agencies
- Working cooperatively to acquire and restore rivers, streams, and wetlands in coastal southern California
- Accelerate the pace, extent and effectiveness of wetlands recovery in the region
- Geographic scope: Point Conception to Mexico



WRP Work Plan

- The Work Plan identifies priority projects for acquisition, planning, restoration and enhancement of wetlands in the coastal watersheds of Southern California.
- supports the WRP's Regional Restoration Strategy
- a valuable tool for communicating regional priorities, funding needs and facilitating agency collaboration.
- Projects selected become eligible for technical assistance from WRP Staff and for funding by WRP partner agencies.

- Pre-proposals due: November 30, 2012
- Pre-proposal review meetings: Jan Feb 2013
 - must be invited to submit Full Proposal
- Full proposals due: May 3, 2013
- Staff review of proposals: May June 2013
- WMG proposal review meeting: July 10, 2013
- Update Work Plan: July August 2013
- BOG Work Plan adoption: Sep/Oct 2013

- RFP will be released in January 2013
- Proposals due in Mar/Apr 2013
- Committee review of proposals: Apr/May 2013
- Project Agreements established: Jun Aug 2013
- Projects begin later summer or Fall 2013
- → Project implementation durations should be planned to be "on the order of a year"

3. Project summary

Infestations of Cape Ivy, Kikuyu Grass, and other non-native pest plants that have established near the terminus of the Santa Barbara water tunnel in upper Mission canyon will be eliminated through several rounds of manual weeding over the course of two years.

Ten Considerations for a Stronger Application

- 1. Meet the criteria and goals of the grant program.

 Eligibility requirements are usually clearly laid out; read the RFP carefully
- 2. Start early on your project development and proposal. It takes time to identify and work with partners and develop project details and timeline
- 3. If RFP describes 4 criteria, your project really needs to meet all 4 to some degree. Those proposals meeting all the criteria very well will outrank those meeting them only somewhat well, or meeting only some of them very well
 - → This doesn't have to be a limitation; it may be an opportunity

Ten Considerations for a Stronger Application

- 4. Follow instructions when completing the application. It might seem obvious, but people don't do it.
- 5. Use your space wisely; not all sections are of equal importance.
- 6. Do not include broad statements in your proposal; be specific.
- 7. Use a descriptive title



Ten Considerations for a Stronger Application

- 8. In an electronic submittal, be organized consolidate files; don't send a cover letter, the proposal, the budget, a map, and 4 images, all as separate files.
- 9. Provide a detailed budget, so that we know your request is a well founded number, and it enables us to work with you on potential revisions. Make sure the budget line items correlate with the Project Description.

10. It's a competitive world - if you can't meet the grant's requirements, find another grant
