



Primary objective is to improve habitat of floodplains and forests by controlling "A" and "B" rated weeds.

#### Three seasons for grant implementation:

- 1. Pull or spray musk thistle from late May through late July, before seed dispersal.
- 2. Survey approx. 6,000 acres per year of Forest Health and Watershed Improvement Projects to look for new infestations of invasive plants.
- 3. Plant with native seed to fill in bare soil areas to prevent erosion.





Left uncontrolled, musk thistle often becomes a dominant component of the floodplains.




