




National Cohesive Wildland Fire Management Strategy


"Safely and effectively extinguish fire, when needed; use fire where allowable; manage our natural resources; and as a nation, live with wildland fire."

Invasive Species and Wildland Fire

Activity: Assess options for managing the interaction between invasive species and wildland fire, invasive species messaging, identify high priority fire-invasive coordination activities

Opportunities for more integrated management actions:

- 1. Proactive and pre-fire invasive species and fire management actions
- 2. Coordination between fire and invasive species management in **response** to wildfire
- 3. Coordinated fire and invasive species wildfire **recover and restoration** efforts
- 4. Coordination between fire and invasive species information management tools
- Coordination between fire and invasive species
 research and development activities
