CHAPTER 315

An act to amend Sections 7270, 7271, 7272, and 7273 of, and to add Sections 7270.5 and 7272.5 to, the Food and Agricultural Code, relating to agriculture, and making an appropriation therefor.

[Filed with Secretary of State September 07, 2000. Approved by Governor September 02, 2000.]



THE INVASION CURVE Long-Term Control AREA OCCUPIED EDRR Window of Opportunity Containment COSTS Eradication Prevention Invasive species widespread and abundant; long-term control aimed at population supression and Rapid increase in distribution and abundance; Invasive Small number of species localized populations; eradication possible eradication unlikely resource protection absent TIME → **Entry of Invasive Species**
