Federal agency cuts

"Federal agency staff working to protect natural resources are a critical part of California's land stewardship community."

- Staff cuts
 - We lost both early-career and experienced late-career workers
 - Reduced collaborative capacity
- Grant funds

Accomplishments

Training:

- Conducted trainings for Local Conservation Corps statewide
- Organized the 34th annual Cal-IPC Symposium

On the ground:

- Supported work in SF Bay on Spartina, Limonium, and Paspalum
- Helped coordinate Volutaria work in Borrego Springs
- Funded weed control projects on four National Forests







Accomplishments

Conservation Resources:

- Assessed 10 species for the Inventory, led interstate collaboration with WA, OR, NV, and AZ
- Completed the CalWeedMapper timeline tool
- Supported PlantRight, continued development of PRE tool
- Completed herbicide calibration training video
- Secured funding to extend functionality of WeedCUT online tool

Accomplishments

Management planning:

- Updated management plan for the Orange County Central Reserve
- Drafted management plan for Golden Gate National Rec'n Area
- Began planning with Orange County Parks and the City of Vista

Advocacy:

- Helped pass SB 653 on environmentally sensitive veg'n management
- Advocated for WMA funding and ISCC/CISAC funding
- Spoke up for herbicides as a key part of IPM for wildland weeds

Vision – what are our goals for 2030?

Context:

- ↑ California's 30x30 Initiative
- Stewardship tracking now required (AB 900)
- ↑ WMAs getting 3 years of funding (2026, 2027, 2028 thru June)
- CalWeedMapper timeline tool tracks yearly progress
- Federal agencies weakened

Vision - 2030 "Stop the Spread" goal

Five years from now:

- WMAs have received steady funding every year
- WMAs covering 30% of the state's counties are fully controlling 30% of the top priority EDRR weeds in their region every year, stopping their spread
- The land stewardship workforce is well trained, growing, and broadening
